The creatives for the summer campaign banners were strategically designed to promote road safety and awareness among the community members of ACT traveling to and from the coast and including community members of the Eurobodalla These banners utilized vibrant colours and concise messaging aimed at encouraging safe driving practices during the holiday season.

The launch event at Brookes Hill rest stop, Bungendore served as a crucial moment in initiating community engagement and awareness for the summer campaign. Key stakeholders including AFP, ACT Government, Transport for NSW members of Southern Region, NSW Police, Queanbeyan and Batemans Bay, QPRC RSO, and ESC RSO, were in attendance. This was a collaborative effort towards promoting road safety across different jurisdictions.









19 February meeting with representatives from KHRSP, ACT Government, AFP, Queanbeyan Palerang Regional Council, and Eurobodalla Shire Council proved to be a crucial step in advancing our road safety initiatives. The agenda covered a range of topics vital for the success of our upcoming campaigns, including banner creatives, marquee design, creative strategies for shopping centres and petrol stations, as well as logistical details such as workshop dates during National Road Safety Week and the launch date.

Creatives for Shopping Centres and Petrol Stations: HVSI's funding opened exciting possibilities for spreading our message of sharing the Kings Highway with Heavy Vehicles. Pinning down the dates for Launch and workshops during National Road Safety Week was confirmed. We decided on May 1 for the launch and workshops to be held May 5th to 12th, which feels like the perfect window to capture attention and driver feedback in relation to traveling on the Kings Highway and sharing the road with Heavy Vehicles.

Discussions with different groups like the ACT Government, KHRSP, and NHVR about the banner designs and using NHVR's ideas to tackle driver fatigue and sharing the road with heavy vehicles.

March 13th, we started chatting with QMS Media about getting the word out there. We're looking into using digital billboards in Canberra and ad spaces at petrol stations to get the message out there. Representatives from various organisations committed to enhancing road safety.

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




This year's theme is 'Don't get in a truckie's face, give them space'.

Workshop held at Ryrie Park, Braidwood during NRSW May 2024

The road safety workshops held in Braidwood on Tuesday, May 7, and Friday 10 May, faced challenging weather conditions by cold, wind, and rain. Despite the adverse weather, the event was attended by various stakeholders, including Monaro Highway Patrol (HWP), Batemans Bay HWP, Traffic Response Queanbeyan Police, Queanbeyan-Palerang Regional Council (QPRC) Road Safety Officer (RSO), Becks Transport training, and over 20 members of the public over the two days, being caravan travelers, students travelling to the Batemans Bay coast, other people driving on the roads. The workshop aimed to address road safety concerns on the Kings Highway, particularly focusing on heavy vehicles. Reflective stickers, information materials, and Kings Highway keep cups were distributed during the event.

The workshop provided valuable information and resources to attendees, as evidenced by the positive feedback received, particularly from caravan travelers who found the information informative. Distribution of reflective stickers, information materials, and Kings Highway keep cups not only served as educational tools but also as reminders of road safety best practices, such as take regular fatigue

breaks, understand the importance of giving trucks space on the roads. The engagement of multiple stakeholders, including law enforcement and local government, further strengthens the impact of the workshop in addressing road safety concerns.

The majority of survey participants were residents of Canberra, indicating a significant interest in road safety along the Kings Highway. Many respondents reported regular travel on the Kings Highway, particularly during trips to and from the coast. It's notable that most travelers shared driving responsibilities with another person, highlighting a common practice of shared driving on longer journeys.

Becks Transport Training provides updates and training for heavy vehicle licenses in both the ACT and NSW regions. Representatives from Becks Transport Training attended both workshops, offering members of the public an opportunity to sit in a heavy vehicle. This allowed participants to gain insights into the perspective of heavy vehicle drivers and their field of vision.

Survey results revealed that participants typically plan their trips along the Kings Highway, incorporating breaks for fuel, toilet stops, and meals. Strategies for managing fatigue included changing drivers, prioritising a good night's sleep before the journey, and taking regular breaks. These findings suggest a proactive approach to road safety among respondents, emphasising the importance of rest and breaks in preventing driver fatigue.

The majority of drivers reported encountering heavy vehicles on the Kings Highway during their journeys. Interestingly, many respondents expressed feeling intimidated by these vehicles, indicating a potential risk associated with sharing the road with larger vehicles. Understanding and addressing these concerns are crucial for improving driver confidence and safety on the Kings Highway.

More than half of the surveyed drivers noted the presence of road safety advertising/messages and police enforcement along the Kings Highway, such as banners, police and advertisements at petrol stations. This suggests a reasonable level of awareness regarding road safety initiatives and law enforcement efforts in the region.

In conclusion, the survey results provide valuable insights into driver perceptions, behaviors, and road safety awareness on the Kings Highway. By addressing identified concerns and implementing interventions, and education we can work towards improving road safety outcomes and enhancing the overall driving experience for travelers along the Kings Highway.




There is a clear decreasing trend in the number of crashes over the years, from 108 in 2013 to 34 in 2023 and there is a decreasing trend in casualties, from 88 in 2013 to 22 in 2023.

The data shows fluctuations in both crashes and casualties from year to year, while there's an overall decreasing trend, there are variations in specific years. For E.g., there is a noticeable decrease in crashes and casualties from 2013 to 2016.

While both crashes and casualties are decreasing over time, the rate of decrease in casualties seems to be slightly slower compared to crashes. This suggests there may still be room for improvement in terms of reducing the severity of those accidents.

The decreasing trend in crashes and casualties could indicate the effectiveness of various safety measures, such as KHRSP campaigns, improved infrastructure, public awareness campaigns, stricter



enforcement of traffic laws, and advancements in vehicle safety technology.

Overall, the data suggests a positive trend in terms of reducing both crashes and casualties over the years, but continued efforts are needed to sustain and further improve road safety.



- Injury or Fatal Crashes peaked in January 2022 with 5 incidents and have generally decreased since then.
- Non Injury non Fatal Crashes show some variability but generally occur less frequently compared to the other categories.
- Tow Away only incidents show some fluctuations but have remained relatively consistent over time.
- From December 2023 to February 2024, there were no Injury or Fatal Crashes reported, indicating a potential improvement or change in road safety. This could be related to various factors, such as enhanced awareness campaigns like the Kings Highway Partnership, increased authority by NSW and ACT policing, advertisements, and education. These initiatives likely contributed to increased awareness and education among road users generally and during peak periods, promoting safer driving practices and reducing crashes.

Certain offenses, such as speeding detected by lidar, show seasonal peaks (e.g., January 2022, February 2023), possibly influenced by factors such as holiday seasons, law enforcement, possible changes in reported incidents over time, public awareness campaigns, or changes in driver behavior.




Heavy Vehicle Update

During the 12 months to the end of March 2024, 151 people died in crashes involving heavy vehicles.

This year alone, 19 fatalities involving heavy vehicles have occurred between 1 January 2024 and 31 March 2024, a 13% increase on the previous quarter.

To gauge how well our campaign is working, it's crucial to keep monitoring and evaluating its effectiveness continuously. We need feedback from the public to see how they're responding and make any necessary adjustments to ensure we have the maximum impact.

Looking beyond our immediate goals, the need to keep up our efforts in promoting road safety awareness. We should think about long-term strategies that will help us maintain our momentum and the importance of sustaining efforts towards road safety awareness and ensure lasting behavioural changes among road users.
